From the Executive Director's Desk

Early this year, Saving Birds member Dennis Turner contacted me to ask if we would accept the gift of six acres of property he and his wife Kathy purchased last fall. The land is on North

Cove Trail, across from the Turner's summer cottage. Our county was still under snow when Dennis sent his email, but in May I went to check it out after the snow had finally cleared. The property is swampland, and is filled with cedars and hemlocks. Although it's hardly a prime building lot, it is fantastic for nesting veeries, certain warblers, and other migrant songbirds. Most of all, it is perfect for nesting Winter Wrens.

At only four inches long, Winter Wrens are one of the smallest songbirds in North America. But one would imagine their songs

coming from something much larger as their beautiful, flutelike notes carry afar in the damp forests they inhabit.

Because of my special affinity for these tiny creatures, there was, for me, a special kind of magic with this gift. Winter Wrens were, after

all, the inspiration for my husband and me to sell our lakefront property more than twenty years ago and purchase the land where we established Charter Sanctuary. Eight years later, as a direct result of the efforts on our sanctuary, Saving Birds Thru Habitat was born. For the organization to now own a piece of land where these little birds can nest safely in perpetuity is like closing the circle. We sold our home – where Winter Wrens nested – and bought a place where they would not be able to nest. But with the Turner's generous gift, Saving Birds now owns a piece of land where they can breed forever.

Letter From Our Board President



It is an honor to be sending you my first message as President of the Board of Directors for Saving Birds Thru Habitat. All on the Board and in the organization owe great thanks to Gina Erb. Gina

ended her term this summer after working diligently for the organization for twelve years on the board, six as its President. We are so grateful for all she has done for SBTH and are delighted that she is continuing to support us all through committee work. I know that I have big shoes to fill!

I recently obtained a copy of the 40-year-old book *They Saved Our Birds; The Battle Won and the War to Win* by Helen Osso. It recaps historical trends that threatened, and in many cases destroyed, bird populations, and the efforts to save and restore the birds. Everything from the devastation caused by fashion as women adorned their hats with feathers in the late 19th century, to the unregulated hunting of many species, to the devastation and subsequent ban of DDT in the early 1960's is covered. The author concludes with the caution that "many species of our birds are threatened through loss of habitat. They are being crowded out as the demand grows for more houses, more oil, more roads, more recreation areas – more everything it seems except time for man to know himself in solitude and in nature." I was struck by the statement that we, together, are carrying on the fight and making a difference today through the work of SBTH.

In this newsletter, you'll read of many exciting and far-reaching efforts that SBTH is making to foster better understanding of the issues of habitat loss and the need for habitat creation on a localized level. Of particular excitement is our work to inspire new generations in the joys of learning about birds, habitat, and our role as stewards. We are thrilled to be involved in the work with the Ronald Brown Academy in Detroit under the leadership of Board Member Dave Watkins. We hope that you are as excited as we are – and that you will help spread the word about SBTH to friends near and far. We'd love to have them join the effort!

What's in Your Yard?

The primary message of Saving Birds is that native plants host insects essential to birds. This connection between healthy native plant communities and the survival of migratory songbirds is now well established, as is the destructive effect to the environment caused by the cultivation of alien plant species, virtually all of which are potentially invasive.

As people become aware of this growing problem, and decide they want to be responsible stewards of their land, a movement to "plant native" is growing around the country. Some nurseries have geared up to meet this demand, the range of plants available is often limited or includes species inappropriate for our region. Plants that are specialized cultivars of native species may not provide all of the benefits we seek when we make the commitment to garden and landscape with native plants. Cultivars may also have a negative effect on the gene pool of the wild plants.

One overlooked approach to this challenge is to learn to recognize, preserve and nurture the native plants that are already on your property, or native plants that continually arise from the existing seed bank in the soil. We can schedule a visit and survey your property to help you identify the desirable native plants that are volunteers, plants that are showing up in your lawn or garden all on their own.

SBTH Backyard Habitat Certification Program



Our backyard habitat certification program has moved right along since it was established in the spring of 2014, thanks to our partnership with Perennial Harvest, a local native landscaping company. The most notable certification was for the Village of Elk Rapids, the first community in the world to be certified by Saving Birds. Also certified was the six acres surrounding Pine Hollow Institute in Elk Rapids and the gardens at Oryana Natural Food Store in Traverse City as well as many private landscapes. Contact Perennial Harvest (www.perennialharvest.org) if you are interested in having your property certified.



Our backyard certification reaches all the way to Beaver Island. This sign is on Pam and Brad Grassmick's acreage in the center of the island. It has few invasive species, lots of native vegetation and is full of birds.
